Communication, Communication, Communication

One of the constants of working in education is that effective communication is essential. This means between children and professionals, families and professionals, and between professionals. To ensure effective communication, here are some guidelines for what gets communicated when, by whom and where.

Check-ins on the school gate: staff on the school gates between 08.50 and 09.00 and at 15.15. This is a great time to pass over general and non-confidential messages between families and professionals. It is very important, however, that we respect that teachers/teaching assistants



need to be in school to teach their class at 09.00 or to consolidate their day at 15.30.

Longer conversations with professionals: we are always happy to have longer conversations with families about their children – these are essential. These need to be arranged in advance at a mutually convenient time. For professionals, this is often after school, and it cannot be guaranteed this will be the same or even the next day. A teacher's working day does not end at 15.30 and they have many tasks, meetings, training to complete after the children have left the building. I would not expect professionals to give up their lunch or statutory entitled breaks to complete work activities. It is best to arrange these meetings through the school office or with the teacher directly. Scheduled meetings/workshops: we regularly hold family information sessions. These include parent consultations, family voice sessions, book looks, homework shares, teaching and learning workshops and events in which families are invited into school. These are great events to learn more about how we run our school and what part families can play in supporting their child's education.

Self-service information: the school publishes a large amount of information for families to refer to. Curriculum newsletters, progression maps, newsletters, specific letters to parents, class blogs and diary dates. If you cannot find the information you are looking for the school office is always available to answer queries you may have or direct you to the relevant information.

Communicating specific information: for some communication the school has specific protocols. Absences should be communicated to the school via phone or email no later than 09.00 on the day of absence. Concerns should be raised to the teacher and/or Principal in the first instance with a clear desired outcome stated. These protocols are important to ensure the school accurately meets its requirements for safeguarding and compliance.

How to communicate and role-modelling: everyone who works in our school is a professional. They have trained for a number of years to be able to work in education and, in our school's case, are very experienced. As such they deserve to be respected and trusted as that professional. Working in education is not 'just a job' and every member of staff working in school does so because they are passionate about positive outcomes for our children – every professional has the best interests of the children as their first priority. Communication should reflect this and be mutually respectful, accepting and trusting.

Role-modelling how families, children and professionals speak to one another is important. Rude, aggressive or accusatory communication will not be tolerated in any form. School adults should be addressed by their title and surname, especially when in the presence of children, e.g., Mr Hill. All school staff are, of course, people with rich and varied lives outside of school and many families may know school staff personally – we are a small community in which we have close links, and we consider ourselves one large family – however when in the professional space of the school building, appropriate address should be used. This sets a positive example for our children and establishes the appropriate level of respect and trust.

Forest School









Barn Owls - procrastinate




Book Review

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What Parents & Carers Need to Know about

iPADS

WHAT ARE THE RISKS? Apple debuted the first iPad in 2010, kickstarting the tablet market, and it remains the best-selling tablet to this day. Although Apple doesn't offer a child-specific version, iPads are hugely popular with youngsters due to their ease of use and endless choice of apps. There's a selection of models, with different-sized screens and distinct features – including the standard iPad; the iPad Air; the iPad Pro; and the iPad mini. Thankfully, they all offer parental controls so you can regulate how your child uses the device ... and how long they spend on it.

INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT

Even if it would never occur to your child to go searching online for age-inappropriate sites, apps information, there's always a possibility that something unexpected – perhaps a video that auto-plays or content incorrectly suggested by an algorithm – could appear on their tablet and upset them. You can help prevent this by adjusting the content settings (see adjusting the content settings (see

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PHYSICAL DAMAGE

While some tablets (such as the Amazon Fire Kids editions) come with rugged shock-proof cases, iPads aren't built for rough and tumble. They're also more expensive than most other tablets, and any damage your child's iPad suffers could be costly to repair. Buying a child-friendly case and screen protector for the device could be a wise move, especially if it's being used by younger ones.

SCREEN ADDICTION

Like most digital devices, tablets have the potential to become quite addictive. You might find your child spending too long staring at their iPad, which could lead to irritability, mood swings and a loss of interest in more important tasks. If this happens, be sure to visit the built-in screen time settings and ensure you limit how long they're able to spend on the device each day.

SIRI SUGGESTIONS

The parental controls built into iOS (the fundamental operating system of Apple devices) enable you to block access to most age-inappropriate content - but your child could potentially still bypass these restrictions (either accidentally or deliberately) by using Siri, Apple's volce-activated digital assistant. To avoid this, togglis the 'Ask Siri' functions to 'off' in the iPad's settings menu.

Advice for Parents & Carers

ENABLE FAMILY SHARING

Before letting little ones loose on an iPad, it's a good idea to set up Family Sharing, as this lets you utilise the parental controls to manage exactly how your child is able use the device. You can do this fairly easily by going into the iPad's settings; once there, you'll be able to add an existing Apple account (if your child already has one) or set one up from scratch.

APPLY SOME LIMITS

The 'Downtime' function allows you to tell the iPad to lock itself at certain periods (at mealtimes or before bed, for instance), while 'App Limits' removes access to certain apps once they've been used for a specified length of time each day. The iPad can display a reminder when these limits have nearly been reached, letting your child mentally prenare for the end of their agming or viewing time.

STOP ACCIDENTAL SPENDING

To empower your child with an increased sense of freedom on their device (without giving yourself something else to worry about in the process) you could enable the iPad's 'Ask to Buy' feature. Whenever your child tries to download or buy an app, game or product, the iPad sends you a request to approve (or deny!) it. This option only becomes available if you've set up Family Sharing.

SET CONTENT AND PRIVACY RESTRICTIONS

The parental controls can stop the iPad from displaying explicit or age-inappropriate content (in apps like iTunes and Safari, for instance) when your child is signed into their account. You'll also be able to restrict the capacity to download and install apps, and you can specify permissions which prevent children from changing the iPad's privacy settings once you've selected them.

TRACK IT DOWN

Just like the iPhone, Apple's iPads have 'Find My' software to help you locate your child's iPad — or indeed, any linked Apple devices that have gone AWOL, including phones, watches and AirPods. If you enable 'Find My' in the settings menu, it will display the last known location of an iPad that's been mislaid, as well as giving you the option to lock a missing iPad that you suspect has been stolen.
