The Owlets released 10 butterflies into the sensory garden. The children enjoyed observing them fluttering from flower to flower.








Words of the Week

"Danny Champion of the World" by Roald Dahl

Imagine being 9 years-old, waking at 2 in the morning, then getting into an old car and driving it around dark lanes to find a missing person (don't do it!). This is the sort of adventure that Roald Dahl had the imagination to include in "Danny, Champion of the World".

What seems like a story of childhood idyll is tinged with sadness. Danny lives in a caravan at the garage his father owns and runs in the countryside, going to school, learning how to maintain and fix car engines, and observing the sometimes strange people who live locally. His mother died when he was very young, and there is that sense of loss, despite the fact that the story demonstrates to us what a fantastic father Danny's dad is throughout.

Naturally, this being a Roald Dahl story, a nasty character appears who needs

to be overcome. It comes in the form of Mr Victor Hazell, a wealthy landowner who threatens Danny with retribution should he find fingerprints on his Rolls Royce after it has been worked on in the garage.

This triggers a plan to humiliate Mr Hazell involving poaching, pheasants, raisins and several local, sympathetic community members.

There is plenty of suspense, and a sense of danger in this story, as well as joy and triumph, but its real magic lies in its invention and clever plot twists.

Advice for Parents & Carers

TALK ABOUT IT

If your child is old enough and chooses to download and use Amino, it's probably wise to remind them of some online safety basics – such as how not everyone in the digital world is who they claim to be, for example, or not to give out personal information online. It might also be a good idea to go into the app's settings and disable incoming chat requests from users that your child doesn't know

STAY UPDATED

Ensure that your child knows to report any upsetting or worrying online content they might see to you. As much as possible, try to stay aware of which communities they're joining on Amino. Most of these areas are well moderated and full of innocent conversation about common interests, but on any platform of this breadth, there's always the potential for chats to veer off into potentially harmful places.

If you haven't already, you might want to consider setting up controls such as Family Sharing (on IOS devices) or Family Link (on Android) so, from your own device, you can keep an eye on how much screen time your child is having – and what apps they're spending it on. This can be extremely useful with regard to platforms such as Amino, which can be quite addictive and reward repeated use.

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
