Moorland Hub update

The first few weeks of the academic year have seen the new Moorland Hub – Boasley Cross, Bridestowe, Lydford, Milton Abbot and Northlew – begin their journey of working together for the benefit of all our children. This week, children from the hub came together to form two teams at the Okehampton Area Year 5/6 football festival. All the children had a great time with friends being made – 2nd place for the Bridestowe/Milton Abbot team and 4th for the Boasley/Northlew team was a great achievement. The highlight of my day was on leaving hearing a child say to a new friend "Thanks, mate, see you next week at the Cross Country!" – testament to the aim of building relationships in our small schools. Similarly, last week Year 3/4 Boasley children travelled to Bridestowe for a rugby festival.

Also, this week, we have confirmed our annual trip to the Pantomime on December 13th where all 5 schools will come together for a fun Christmas celebration. Residentials for Year 3/4, hosted at Bradford primary with outdoor activity and surfing in late June and Year 5 to Bristol at the end of June. These will include all Moorland Hub, Ruby Hub and Exbourne primary, bringing together all the small schools (Under 100 pupils) in Dartmoor Multi Academy Trust. Information sessions for the Trust wide Year 6 trip to France are also upcoming.

At Boasley this week, the first Stay and Play session was a huge success with 10 families joining the event. It was lovely to welcome new babies and toddlers to our school and meet new adults. Look out for similar events at all the Hub Schools.

Bridestowe welcomed Devon Wildlife Trust to the school with a focus on identifying trees from their leaves and making nature crowns – a lovely event to be part of! Forest school is an important focus for all Moorland Hub Schools

At Lydford last Sunday, a family working party day attracted nearly 30 adults and children coming together to tidy the forest school. A fantastic event with real community spirit – thank you to all who took part. Look out for similar events at all the Hub Schools.

Northlew joined Boasley this week for a trip to Paignton Zoo – a fantastic day for all which mirrored Lydford's trip last week. The children loved seeing the animals and exploring the sustainability messages.

Milton Abbot have been enjoying meeting new friends from the Hub this week and taking part in the afore mentioned football with friends from Bridestowe was a real high. The team finished 2nd, only being pipped 1-0 by Okehampton C.

A final word to thank families for their support with positive attendance. I am aware my approach to attendance this term has caused some discussion, however I am pleased to report that the Moorland Hub has the highest attendance figures for the Trust with Bridestowe topping the table for attendance and the lowest amount of persistent absence. The evidence is irrefutable that high attendance directly correlates to positive achievement and I thank you for your continued support.

Numbot/Times Tables Rock Stars

Your child will be bringing home a personal log-in for either NumBots (EYFS AND Key Stage 1) or Times Table Rockstars (Key Stage 2). Times Table Rockstars is a carefully sequenced programme of daily times table practice. NumBots supports children with their understanding, recall and fluency in mental addition and subtraction so they move from counting to calculating. Please support your child to log into their account. Regular practice really is key to your child making progress in these areas.





What Parents & Carers Need to Know about

WHAT ARE THE RISKS? With more than two billion active users exchanging texts, photos, videos and documents, as well as making voice and video calls, WhotsApplis the world's most popular messaging service. Its end-to-end encryption only allows messages to be viewed by the sender and any recipients not even WhotsApplise II can read them. This privacy issue has been in the spotlight recently, as the UKS Online Safey Billiproposes to end such encryption on private messaging; WhotsApp is unwilling to doco and has reportedly considered with drawing

in UK and Europe;

EVOLVING SCAMS

WhatsApp's popularity makes it a lucrative hunting ground for scammers. Recent examples include posing as the target's child, requesting a money transfer because of a spurious 'emergency'. Plus a scam where fraudsters trigger a verification message by attempting to log in to your account then (posing as WhatsApp) call or text to ask you to repeat the code posk to them alviers then access

CONTACT FROM STRANGERS

To start a chat, someone only needs 'the mobile number of the WhatsApp user that they want to message. If your child has ever given their number out to someone they don't know, that person could then contact them via WhatsApp. It's also possible that your child might be added to a group chat (by one of their friends, for example) containing other people that they don't know.

FAKE NEWS

WhatsApp's connectivity and ease of use allows news to be shared rapidly - whether it's true or not. To combat the spread of misinformation, messages forwarded more than five times on the app now display a "Forwarded mony times" label and a double arrow icon. This makes users aware that the message they've just received is far from an original _ and might not be entirely factual, either.

'VIEW ONCE'

me racility to send images or messages that can only be viewed once has led to some WhatsApp users sharing inappropriate images or abusive texts, knowing that the recipient can't re-open them later to use as evidence of misconduct. People used to be able to screenshot this 'disappearing' content - but a recently added WhatsApp feature now blocks this, citing increased privacy.

CHAT LOCK

Another new option allows users to store certain messages or chats in a separate locked chats' folder, saved behind a passoode, fingerprint or face ID authentication. The risk here is that this function creates the potential for young people to hide conversions and content that they suspect their parents wouldn't approve of (such as age inappropriate material).

VISIBLE LOCATION

WhatsApp's 'live location' feature lets users share their current whereabouts, which can be helpful for friends meeting up or parents checking that their child's safely an the way home, for example. However, anyone in your child's contacts list or in a mutual group chat can also track their location – potentially letting strangers identify a child's home address or journeys that they make regularly.

Advice for Parents & Carers ...TYPING.

EMPHASISE CAUTION

Encourage your child to treat unexpected messages with caution: get them to consider, for example, whether the message sounds like something a friend or relative would really send them. Make sure they know never to share personal details over WhatsApp, and to be wary of clicking on any links in messages. Setting up two-step verification adds a further layer of protection to their WhatsApp account.

ADJUST THE SETTINGS

It's wise to change your child's WhatsApp settings (go to 'Privacy', then 'Groups') to specify which of their contacts can add them to group chats without needing approval; you can give permission to 'My Contacts' or 'My Contacts Except ...'. Additionally, if your child needs to use 'live location', emphasise that they should enable this function for only as long as they need - and they lurn it off.

THINKING BEFORE SHARING Help your child to understand why it's in

neip your child to understand why it's important to stop and think before posting or forwarding something on WhatsApp. It's easy – and all too common – for content to then be shared more widely (even publicly on social media). Encourage your child to consider how an ill-judged message might damage their reputation or upset a friend who sent something to them in confidence.

CHAT ABOUT PRIVACY

Some parents like to check in with their child about how they're using WhatsApp, explaining that it will help to keep them safe. If you spot a 'Locked Chats' folder, you might want to talk about the sort of chats that are in there, who they're with and why your child wants to keep them hidden. Also, if your child has sent any 'view once' content, you could discuss their reasons for using this feature.





