Children's Mental Health Week: 7-13 February 2022

This year's theme is **Growing Together**. To mark this week, we are excited to announce that we will be having a 'Well-being Wednesday' on 9th February.

We will be encouraging children (and adults) to consider how they have grown, and how they can help others to grow.

On the morning of this day, each child will take part in an activity which they have chosen from a diverse selection offered by the adults in the school. Some of the activities to choose from include making Worry People, running, singing, art and dance. We will focus on how taking time out to do something we enjoy can help our mental health and well-being. We will also have time to share the new books we have recently purchased and use these to support us in talking about mental health. Some children will have Forest School on this day, but this will not be affected and will go ahead as normal.



Covid Risk Assessments

There have been updates in the covid guidance from HM Government in recent days. Most notably, the removal of the requirement for adults to wear a face covering in communal areas.

As a school, we are still prioritising the safety of our children, staff and community at all times. Therefore, we continue to strongly encourage the use of face coverings for adults in communal areas and for all visitors to the school. Thank you for your continued support and understanding.

We continue to ensure the safety of our children and staff with the following measures:

- Ventilation in all classrooms
- Enhanced cleaning, especially of high touch services
- Encouraging face coverings for adults in communal spaces.

Morning Timings

Please could I remind all parents that the start of the school day is 08.50 - 09.00am.

Children should not be dropped off at school earlier than 08.50am*.

Please wait outside the front gate or immediately inside the back gate until an adult welcomes you into the school.

*Children coming by DCC Taxi and from Treetops breakfast club have slightly different arrangements.

Whilst there are adults in school, the time before 08.50 is used for vital preparation for the day and staff will often have professional conversations which cannot happen with children in the building.

Severe Weather Procedures

In the event of severe weather, such as snow, the school has a robust system in place to decide upon school closure and communication to parents and carers.

School will open unless it is deemed unsafe to do so. This could be because of a lack of staff or damage caused by severe weather.

Staff who live in close proximity to the school will communicate with Mr Hill to report the conditions. All teachers will decide upon the safety of their travel to school and inform Mr Hill. Using this information, Mr Hill will decide if it is unsafe to open the school.

The school administrator will remain at home to ensure they have constant access to the school comms system to inform parents in a timely manner in the event of a school closure.

If severe weather occurs during the school day and the safety of travelling home is compromised, the school may close early.

Oral and Teeth Hygiene and Drinks Bottles

The school is committed to promoting positive oral hygiene for all our children. The new Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS) framework sets out the school's responsibility: 'The provider must promote the good health, including the oral health, of children attending the setting.'

The Department for Education explain its inclusion: 'Nearly a quarter of 5-year-olds in England have tooth decay, with 3 or 4 teeth affected on average. Tooth extraction is one of the most common procedures for children under 6 in hospital. Extraction is also the most common reason for hospital admission for children aged 6 to 10. Children from more deprived backgrounds are more likely to have tooth decay.'

As a result, we are developing our education for healthy lifestyles to include suitable drinks at school. Children should only have water in their drinks bottles. Squash, even sugar-free options, is a significant contributor to poor oral hygiene and tooth decay. This is not only because of high levels of sugar or aspartame, but because of the nature of drinks bottles forcing the liquid into the front teeth and children being encouraged to drink regularly.

We appreciate that some children may prefer to have squash or flavoured water and your child's class teacher will be happy to discuss ways to encourage drinking water.

Snowy Owls Sound Project

We learnt that to produce a sound with an instrument, you can strike, pluck or blow it. We discovered that these group of instruments are called percussion, string or wind.

We made our own string instrument and plucked it to make a sound. Then we experimented with pitch and used our knowledge to explain what was happening.
